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Berkeley High School Redesign Plan

On February 3, 2010, at the Board of Education meeting, the Board will consider the proposed *Berkeley High School Redesign Plan*. One aspect of the proposed BHS Redesign Plan has sparked a lot of controversy, that is, a recommendation made by the school's leadership team and supported by the School Governance Council to direct some of the teacher time which has been assigned, for the past several years, to science lab classes held during the "0" or 7th period to "Equity Grants."

"Equity Grants" were intended to allow all disciplines and small schools to apply for any additional teachers allocated to the school to support struggling students. This proposal, however, raised concerns that if the extra time for AP/IB science classes was reduced, students may not receive instruction of the full curriculum and this might impair their ability to pass the AP and IB tests.

To examine the implications of this proposal, I met with the principal and six science teacher leaders for a number of hours over the course of the last several weeks and together we developed a revised proposal which is outlined below. This is part of what the School Board will be reviewing at its February 3rd meeting. The revised proposal from the administration and science teacher leaders is as follows:

- To continue to provide extra time as currently exists for AP and IB Biology, Chemistry and Physics. At this time, AP Environmental Science is not included in the recommendation for additional time, but this is still under review while we determine what is needed to meet the requirements for the College Board Standards for AP Environmental Science.
- O To begin an enhanced science option in College Prep Biology, Chemistry and Physics for any student who requests it. This would be a credited lab course to be held once a week before or after school. Approximately, 1.0 additional FTE would be required to implement this program.

While I am in support of these recommendations, and believe that thoughtful work has gone into developing them, at this time, I can only pledge that these recommendations will be seriously considered during the District's budget development process for the next school year. We are just at the start of this process now and do not know with certainty what funds the District will have from either the State allocation or from the BSEP Special Tax. We know that the State budget is in grave condition and we are aware that we, along with most other districts, will have to again make major budget cuts both next year and the following year (2011-12). Therefore I want to emphasize that we must use our District process to determine whether there will be sufficient BSEP monies to provide additional allocation of teachers for all supplementary programs..

The budget development process will continue throughout this spring and will include discussions with the Superintendent's Budget Advisory Committee as well as with the BSEP Planning and Oversight Committee. These groups, as well as others, will be advising me about the recommendations which I ultimately bring to the Board of Education. As I stated earlier, I support this proposal for additional teachers for science labs at BHS, but my first responsibility is to determine the District's overall budget situation, to work through the District's budget development process, and then to bring my recommendations to the Board of Education after completing this process.

BSEP Site Dollars Go Far @ Berkeley High

Since 1987-88, 22 classes of seniors (16,000+ students) have graduated from Berkeley High School. For the past 22 years and continuing today, BUSD students have been the beneficiaries of the generosity of Berkeley voters, whose continued support of the Berkeley Schools Excellence Program (BSEP) property tax measures (most recently Measure A of 2006) have made a huge difference in the quality of our students' education.

Part of the BSEP Measure provides specific funds for each school to decide how best to use, to enhance student learning and improve student performance. At \$224 per pupil, BHS received \$717,248 of these BSEP School Discretionary dollars in 2009-2010. The 15 member Berkeley High BSEP Committee, made up of elected parents, students, teachers, and the principal, allocated 14 grants this year, funding a broad array of programs that touch virtually every BHS student and teacher. They are:

School Supplies Initiative Delivers in Berkeley

Every year, over 50,000 Berkeley, Oakland and West Contra Costs County students attend school unable to afford the basic school supplies needed to succeed. According to Benito Delgado-Olson, Executive Director of KtoCollege, this figure is 128,293 in the East Bay and over 3.1 million in California.
