- ~can use calculator on some math
- ~website: collegeboard.org

Next Test Dates:

- ~March 9

- University of California (9)
- California State Universities (23)

Community College

- ❖ 2-year college option where students often go for...
- ❖ General Education, Technical Programs, Transfer into 4-year school
- ❖ Typical transfer takes 2 years, some in less (transfers save \$\$\$)
- ❖ T.A.G. (Transfer Admission Guarantee) → for some UCs or CSUs (pending GPA and pre-reqs)
- ❖ TOTAL Cost of Attendance: ~\$5,000 (tuition, fees, transportation, books)





UC (University of California)

- 1 Application → All 9 Campuses (My UC Application)
 - List of extracurriculars/honors/awards
- 4 Short Essays (Personal Insight Questions)
- Requirements???
 - No Letters of Rec
 - SAT/ACT? **Yes, no later than December 2019**
 - Course Requirement? **Yes, A-G Requirements**
 - What GPA do they look at? **10th-11th grade GPA***
 - 3.0 UC GPA makes you *eligible*
 - TOTAL Cost of Attendance for a CA Resident:
~\$35,000 (tuition, books, health insurance,
room/board, personal/transportation.





The California State University

- ❖ 1 Application for ALL 23 Cal States
- ❖ Same A-G Course Requirements as UC's
- ❖ SAT/ACT test **required***
- ❖ Letters of Rec **not** required
- ❖ Eligibility: 2.0 GPA min. + Test Score
(Refer to index)
- ❖ Some majors are *impacted*
- ❖ TOTAL Cost of Attendance: ~\$25,000
(Tuition, Transportation, Dorms, etc.)

- ~Privately funded (tuition or private donations)
- ~Tend to be smaller in student population/classroom size
- ~Tend to cost more for tuition* (*many privates are generous with financial aid, though*)
- ~Most Private Colleges are on the **Common Application** (Personal statement, letters of rec)

- ~CSS Profile (additional financial aid app)
- ~SAT Subject Tests?
- ~Supplemental Essays

Historically Black Colleges & Universities

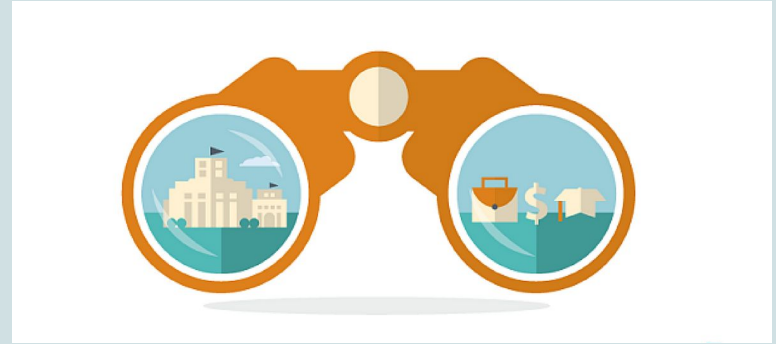
- ~Originally established as educational institutions for students of African-American descent during Segregation

TIPS before going to a college fair

Before the Fair:

- **Ask yourself “Why do I want to go to college?”** This may sound basic but you’ll be surprised how difficult this question might be for you to answer in the beginning.
- **Consider what you are looking for in a school:** big/small, major, urban/rural, 2-year/4-year, religiously-affiliated, athletics, Greek life, special programs/opportunities, etc.
- **Make a list of schools that are a “must” to connect with.** You may not be able to get to every college, so know ahead of time what type of colleges you would be interested in attending.
- **Register online ahead of time, if applicable.** Registering will give you a bar code the college rep will be able to scan to get your contact information.
- **Type your contact info, high school name, graduation year, major, etc. on sticky labels for contact cards.**
- **Talk to at least one college representative from a school you have never heard of.**
- **Prepare a list of interesting, specific questions for the college reps** – this will generate interesting and specific conversations.
- **Make a professional email address.**

During the Fair:

- **Bring a pen, paper, and tote bag** for notes and materials.
- **Grab a map** (if available) to plan your route.
- **Be patient** – you may have to wait in line to talk to a college.
- **Don’t let your parents do all of the talking.**
- **Take notes!** Write down what you find most interesting about each college.
- **Ask for business cards.** Follow up with the rep if you have more questions or just want to thank them for their time.
- **Be adventurous!** Chat with colleges you may not have considered or never heard of.
- **Attend an information session** to learn more about the college search process, financial etc.

After the Fair:

- **Organize and sort through all of the material** you have collected.
- **Make notes about schools that stood out to you** while it is fresh in your mind.
- **Recycle materials** from colleges you have ruled out.
- **Review college websites, catalogs, and view books** of the schools that interested you most.
- **Write down any additional questions** you want to follow up about.

- **Consider sending a thank you email to the college rep.** This simple gesture can show admission officials you are serious about wanting to attend their college.
- **Talk to your parents and counselor** about what schools peaked our interest and why.
- **Adjust your college list accordingly**, if necessary.
- **Start scheduling visits** to your top schools.
- **Read e-mails** to see when colleges will be visiting your school or community.

Questions do’s & don’ts

DON’T ask things you can research easily online like:

- What is your freshmen acceptance rate?
- What’s the average GPA of students accepted?
- How cold does it get in the winter?
- What’s the student-to-faculty ratio?
- What’s your school like? (Too general)
- “Is your _____ program good? (Of course it is!)”

Do ask:

- What are the 3 coolest things about your school?
- Where do you like to eat on campus?
- How easy is it to take classes in _____ if I’m a _____ major?
- What are 3 adjectives to describe the type of students at your school?
- What is your favorite tradition at your college?
- Out-of-state colleges: What programs are offered to help out-of-state students adjust living away from home?
- If the rep is an alum: What do you wish you would have taken advantage of at your college?
- What do students like to do on the weekends at your school or in the area?

WHAT YOU NEED TO DO THIS SPRING:

- Get the best grades possible.
- Study for the SAT or ACT and take the exam on time.
- Start the college search. A good place to do so is on collegeboard.org where you can enter your profile into a search engine which will then create a college list for you.
- Attend a college fair.
- Meet with your college counselor in the College and Career Center who can answer your questions and help you with your college list.
- Visit some local colleges and universities.
- Think about which teachers from this year (usually a humanities teacher and one from math or science.) Ask them at the end of the year to do so.
- Get in the habit of reading the emails sent out by the College Career Center.

WHAT YOU NEED TO DO IN THE SUMMER:

- Depending on your ACT or SAT score, continue studying for your preferred test so you can retake it in the fall.
- Continue building your college list.
- Write the Senior Profile, which is a summary of all your activities and allows you to give your counselor a better understanding of who you are so he/she will be able to write a good letter of recommendation for you. The forms will be made available online later in the semester.
- Start on your UC and Common App essays so you have drafts at the beginning of fall and can start working with one of our essay readers in the college center.
